

# Charlotte Mason Preschool Snow and Ice

## Week One

This month's nature study focus is Snow and Ice! If you live in a region that gets snow, do allow your children to enjoy it. Dress appropriately, but spend time outside just walking in the snow, following tracks, building snowmen, throwing snowballs, and making snow angels. If you do not live in a region that gets snow, you can still explore this winter theme with us, as I've tried to make the activities accessible to all climates.

Also, if your preschooler does not have their own nature journal, now is a great time to get them one. Many of our activities will involve nature walks, scavenger hunts, and other activities that preschoolers delight in recording. A nature journal doesn't have to be elaborate. A simple sketch book and colored pencils will work fine for now.

## Week 1

### **Nature Study—Winter Nature Walk**

Take a short nature walk with your preschooler and look for signs of winter. Try to use your senses as you go. Is it cold? Is there frost, snow, or ice you can touch? Are the trees bare? Do you hear winter birds or other animals? Can you find any animal tracks? Do you have any winter plants blooming? Can you smell them? Keep the walk short, but purposeful. Remember, you are trying to help your preschooler engage all of their senses.

### **Handicraft—Finger Knitting**

Finger knitting is generally regarded as a great introductory handicraft for preschoolers. I am introducing this activity early, so your child can continue to work on it all month long, or longer if they enjoy it. If your preschooler is not familiar with finger knitting, you will have to spend some time showing them how to get started.
